Network Building and Community Engagement

A primary component of SOFSA's mission is to strengthen networks, build relationships, and deepen community connections. This aspect of the work takes many forms, but our Open Meetings, committee meetings, site visits, social meet-ups, affinity groups, and other events are all ways to get engaged.

We also worked with a local reporter to connect our partner Monu Chhetri to highlight the work of her organization, Deaf New American Advocacy.

Storytelling

Beyond our partnerships with media, and articles published on our blog, we also maintain Facebook and Instagram pages. Our social media is not only used to promote our work and the work of our partners, but also to tell the story of what we do. In 2022, we published 40 Friday Features and Friday Inspirations, highlighting work done by our staff, interns, Advisory Board members, Community Liaisons, and community partners.











Additionally, we piloted 5
Community Listening Sessions
with 4 different organizations.
These sessions were attended by
over 48 participants, who received
gift cards for their time and stories.
Through these stories, we learned
about the visions that individuals
and organizations working in and
with marginalized communities
have for change in their food
systems.

Funding

Coalition building like we are cultivating at SOFSA does not happen in a silo. Another primary goal of SOFSA is to help folks who have ideas, dreams, and visions access the resources they need to achieve their goals. In 2022, SOFSA helped secure over 1.6 million dollars in funding for our partners through grant writing assistance, letters of support, and partner matchmaking. These funds will be used for projects supporting farming, food access, and food sovereignty in the Syracuse, Onondaga County, and Onondaga Nation area.

In addition, SOFSA secured over 1.1 million dollars in funds from the USDA and other organizations to support our network-building efforts and enhance collaboration across our region's food system. This crucial funding will allow SOFSA's work to continue and grow over the next three years.

As part of our efforts to share abundance across our network, SOFSA's Fundraising Committee established a goal that 15% of any fundraising efforts for SOFSA would go back out to partners. In 2022, we exceeded this goal by distributing 19% of funds raised by SOFSA to partners in the community. We've also worked with our partners at academic institutions to begin tracking this in their own fund-seeking to continually reinvest in the important efforts happening at all levels of our region's food system.

Policy and Planning

The National Committee for Responsive Philanthropy found that for every dollar invested by grant makers and other donors in community engagement and policy, there was an average return of \$115 to that community. With that fact in mind, one of our main directives is local, regional, state, and even federal policy change to create the conditions for a thriving food system in the Syracuse-Onondaga area.

Over the past year, SOFSA facilitated six Policy & Planning Committee meetings, with participation from community members and various elected officials. As we completed another election cycle, we began work on SOFSA's first Policy Platform. This platform — drafted with support from community members, experts, elected officials, and SOFSA's Equity, Inclusion, and Accountability Committee — focuses on:

- Supporting ReZone Syracuse with attention to increasing food access and expanded opportunities for urban agriculture
- Aiding the CNY Regional Market's campaign to update its aging infrastructure
- Advocating for Universal School Meals and increased Farm-to-Institution purchasing
- Increasing state money budgeted for Double Up Food Bucks

SOFSA also completed our second annual candidate questionnaire focusing on food systems issues. We received responses from 7 different candidates representing three different political parties running for office on the local, statewide, and Congressional level.
