SOFSA's 1st Food Justice Gathering



On October 28th, SOFSA hosted its inaugural Food Justice Gathering at Plymouth Congregational Church in downtown Syracuse. The event focused on the theme of the rich legacy of our region's land and peoples.

The day began with a moving opening ceremony led by Dr. Rev. Eric Jackson, SOFSA Director Maura Ackerman, and Deputy Mayor Sharon Owens. SOFSA Community Liaison and event co-organizer, Mable Wilson, delivered a touching musical rendition of "I Come To The Garden." Keynote speaker Karen Washington, an activist-farmer, shared profound insights on food justice – inspiring attendees and setting the day's tone.

"I learned that we are a diverse and extremely skillful community of food system actors, and that we already have all the resources to thrive and build a more just world. The event was a beautiful reminder that sovereignty is power to the people, and that people have come here to voice their power for bottom-up change."

The Gathering covered diverse topics emphasizing knowledge sharing and building connection. Sessions focused on Syracuse's changing landscape, food system careers, and discussions on food and health, Indigenous food sovereignty, and urban agriculture. Overall, attendees left feeling invigorated and empowered to work collectively toward a thriving food system in our region.

The Food Justice Gathering embodied meaningful conversations, community building, and strategic collective action. SOFSA extends heartfelt gratitude to all participants, recognizing their important contributions to this transformative event.



Media

SOFSA's mission is to uplift our partners in the food system by highlighting stories of their work in our community. In the past year, SOFSA was featured in the media at least 20 times! News coverage highlighted many of our collaborative accomplishments, including:

- Advocacy to improve CNY Regional Market infrastructure
- Community-led efforts to improve food access through ReZone Syracuse
- Educating the community about the end of pandemic SNAP increases
- Restoring the mobile market at the Downtown Farmers Market and beyond
- Launching a new Double Up Food Bucks site, expanding access to healthy foods for SNAP recipients
- Supporting the Food Access Healthy Neighborhoods Now!

- Bridging the gap between rural and urban communities with Onondaga Farm Fest

In 2023, we published 31 Friday Features and Friday Inspirations on our social media to highlight the achievements of our staff, interns, Advisory Board members, Community Liaisons, and community partners.



In partnership with Syracuse University's Center for Sustainable Community Solutions, we launched the Onondaga Food Rescue Network (OFRN) in 2023. Modeled after Seven Valleys Food Rescue's success in Cortland County, OFRN combats food waste and insecurity in Onondaga County by connecting stakeholders to redistribute surplus food.

In 2023, OFRN contacted 100 pantries, engaging deeply with 29. OFRN conducted 17 gleaning events, redistributing 3,400 pounds to 11 pantries. As interest grows, we anticipate further dialogue on volunteers and logistics in 2024.



Policy and Planning

The impact of organizing for policy change is clear. According to the National Committee for Responsive Philanthropy, each dollar invested in civic engagement and policy initiatives, returns an average of \$115 to the local community. That's why we advocate at the local, regional, state, and federal level to create policy change for a thriving food system.

In 2023, SOFSA held six Policy & Planning Committee meetings, engaging community members and elected officials. Working alongside the Equity, Inclusion, and Accountability Committee, they developed our inaugural Policy Platform to guide our advocacy efforts. Key achievements include:

- Promoting food access and urban agriculture provisions in Syracuse's ReZone ordinance.
- Advocating for Universal School Meals & expanding meal access for eight Onondaga County schools.
- Supporting infrastructure investments in the CNY Regional Market.
- Collaborating with the New York Farm Bureau on Healthy School Meals for All.
- Supporting Summer EBT benefits through a letter from No Kid Hungry New York.

Looking ahead:

Our 2024 Policy Platform builds on past successes, focusing on leading efforts with our partners to:

- Address root causes of hunger.
- Invest in food system infrastructure for regional economic development.
- Incorporate food access into transportation planning.

Additionally, we continue to support statewide efforts to:

- Ensure all students access free meals at school.
- Expand local procurement in schools, universities, hospitals, and institutions.
- Enhance nutrition assistance programs for food security.

SOFSA also hosted its first Civic Engagement 101 training, convened food policy councils from across New York State, and conducted our third annual candidate questionnaire on food policy issues. Responses from 15 candidates were distributed as voter guide at SOFSA's Food Justice Gathering, which aligned with the first day of early voting in the County.



Gratitude and Reciprocity

This year, SOFSA played a crucial role in securing over \$2.8 million in funding across our network, supporting partners' efforts to advance local agriculture, enhance food access, and promote food sovereignty. As part of our commitment to share abundance within our network, SOFSA's Fundraising Committee set a target for a minimum of 15% of all funds raised by SOFSA itself to directly benefit our network partners. Surpassing expectations, in 2023, we distributed 27% of the funds raised to our community partners.

Plant a Seed for SOFSA

Our annual Plant a Seed for SOFSA fundraising campaign thrived, raising over \$4,000, which was generously matched by the Onondaga County Agriculture Council. Funds raised through the campaign, alongside a \$20,000 investment from the NY Health Foundation, will empower grassroots efforts to improve our region's food system through a new community-driven grantmaking initiative, the **Syracuse-Onondaga Food Justice Fund**. Over the course of this spring, the Fund's leadership council — comprised of community leaders representing diverse interests across the county — will meet to determine funding priorities, eligibility criteria, and selection processes. Join us in April to vote to award the funds to projects that will shape a more equitable future for our region's food system.
